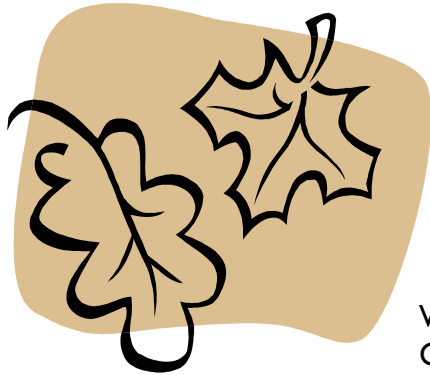

From the Director's Desk



The Lebanon Public Library began as the result of an Andrew Carnegie incentive. If local communities would provide the land, money for annual maintenance, and exercise governance and oversight for the library, Carnegie would supply the money for the building. In 1904, a group of forward thinking individuals in Lebanon, Indiana understood Carnegie's vision to invest in a library in exchange for an informed community with access to all the resources they needed to ensure America's place in the world. The Lebanon Public Library opened its doors to the public in 1905, and has been serving the community for over a hundred years.

In 1999, the Lebanon Public Library Board of Trustees realized that the library needed to grow and expand for a new generation of citizens, so in spirit, Carnegie's vision could be kept alive. That vision has grown to embrace access to information that consists of providing a safe and protective gathering place for young adults that includes free digital resources, having plenty of room for books for all ages, job search help, and other twenty-first century programs that Carnegie could only dream about. With the increasing amount of information available on the Internet, the Board, the Director, the staff, and library advocates believe the library is one of the components of a healthy community.

The Lebanon Public Library's Long Range Plan reflected the Board's, the Director's, and the staff's view that having enough computers and online services for the library's patrons is a high priority for the library, along with homework help, plenty of reading space for adults, children, and young adults. They believe in the strength of the library as an information center in the digital age, as an important resource for those who have the least resources available to them, and as a source to go to for all sorts of public functions, health information, job services, and literacy help and training from birth to senior citizens. A new facility would give the library a place that could address literacy and improve reading skills among children and adults, room for more programs, and access to information about government which includes forms and documents, and providing greater access to computers. The plan included room for the digital library of the future where local historical information is stored and made available digitally to be accessed world wide. It would include space to offer a broad range of books for people from all ranges of life, wireless access so that library users from all over can bring their laptops and be hooked up to the world. This plan included space for outreach programs to local day cares, youth summer camps, BASE and Head-start programs, Homebound deliveries, and a hospital library.

Now that plan is near completion and most of the goals have become realities, the doors are open so that the community has access to the Windows of the World, the young adults have a safe place to gather and literacy is the foundation upon which all these dreams and plans were based. Before noon, on the first day the new facilities opened, 450 visitors and patrons came to check out the new space. The library and the Board invites the community to tour anytime and to come join **The Lebanon Public Library and their Community Teammate The Indianapolis Colts**, in a week long celebration of books, literacy, and access to technology. The celebration starts on Saturday November 11, at 9:00 a. m. for the Ribbon cutting ceremony. Beginning at 2:00 p. m. to 4:00 p. m. there will be a sock-hop for adults in the Sugar Bowl Reading Room. Coney dogs, cokes, and potatoes chips will be served. At 4:00 p.m. the library's fifties girls will pass the key to the Sugar Bowl to the young adults so they can turn the past into their future.

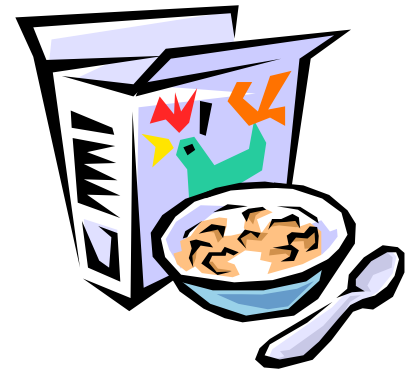

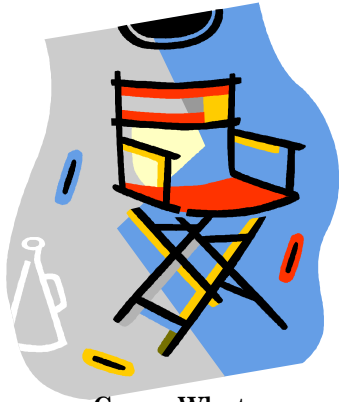

The Ralph Stark Heritage Center: Genealogy and Local History

Have you been to the new Heritage Center? It is the newly renovated space that occupies the 1905 Carnegie Library building. The Ralph Stark Heritage Room still exists but is now a browsing room. It houses the Boone County collection of genealogical records and local history materials. Indiana history items are also found in this room along with special collections; such as Indiana Authors and the Lincoln Collection.

The Heritage Center is large enough to seat an entire classroom. It is a center of genealogical activity and research. A computer for public access, the microfilms, reader and printer are used in this area. Genealogy magazines, high school yearbooks, published family histories and scrapbooks from local organizations are shelved in the Heritage Center. The Heritage Center has a mini-circulation desk where staff can check books in or out from this area.

The Heritage Center follows the same hours of operation as the library. The department is staffed and an opac station, the on-line card catalog, is in the Heritage Center to assist you in finding the materials you need.

Heritage Quest On-Line and Ancestry Library Edition Have Arrived!

The **Ancestry Library Edition** is a collection of over 4 billion names and approx. 4,000 databases including key collections such as U.S. Federal Census images and indexes from 1793-1930; historical maps, social security death index and WW1 draft registration cards.

Heritage Quest Online, designed specifically for libraries, offers onsite and remote access to the largest and continually expanding collections of genealogical materials in the United States.

Heritage Quest Online offers over 20 million page images of census records, over 20,000 family and local history books, with searchable text and images. **PERSI (Periodical Source Index)** is included with over 1.7 million articles indexed from over 6,300 local history and genealogy titles. The Revolutionary War Pension and Bounty Land Warrant Application Files contain records for over 80,000 individuals. **Heritage Quest Online** is a strong complement to **Ancestry Library Edition**.
